

Past OFMA President Paul Oechsle Passes

Paul G. Oechsle, 80, of Convoy, passed away on Saturday, June 3, 2023, at home surrounded by his family. "God made a farmer" on February 5, 1943. He was the son of Lloyd and Marjorie (Kampf) Oechsle, also of Convoy, who proceeded him in death. On November 10, 2007, Paul married Joyce Shuman, who survives in Convoy.

Also surviving are their children: Troy (Jen) Oechsle, Heidi (Duane) Emans, Ann Shuman (Craig Leslie), Andrew Shuman, Edward Shuman, and Thomas (Kristin) Shuman. He is also survived by 6 grandchildren, Austin, Cheyenne, Brady, Shania, William, and Elizabeth, 2 greatgrandchildren, and nieces and nephews.



Paul was also proceeded in death by his only sister, Sue Ann Gallaway.

Paul was a life-long farmer in Harrison Township, where he also raised pigs. While residing in the township, he served as a township trustee and officer for the Van Wert Township Association.

A great joy in his life was the Van Wert County Fair. Paul served on the fair board for 42 years, heading up many departments and holding many offices, including Fair Manager/Secretary for 22 years. Paul also served as a 4-H advisor for 17 years, helping county youth get excited for the fair as much as he was.

Paul's commitment to the fair industry came to a head by serving on the board of the Ohio Fair Manager's Association (OFMA) and became President, serving one two year term in 2006 and 2007. In 2015, he was inducted into the OFMA Hall of Fame. Paul was a member of St. Mary of the Assumption Catholic Church in Van Wert and had joined the Knights of Columbus Council #6034. All his many affiliations brought him great joy. Paul didn't know a stranger and always had a story to tell. He always enjoyed seeing and catching up with all the people he met over the years.

Mass of Christian Burial will be held Saturday, June 10, 2023, beginning at 10:30 a.m. at St. Mary of the Assumption Catholic Church in Van Wert, Ohio with Fr. Chris Bohnsack officiating. Burial will follow in Woodlawn Cemetery in Ohio City, Ohio.

Family and friends will be received from 2-8 p.m. on Friday, June 9, with a Knights of Columbus service starting at 2pm, and 9-10 am Saturday, June 10 2023 at Alspach-Gearhart Funeral Home in Van Wert.

Entertainment Industry loses a Leader, George Moffett

George Moffett, one of the entertainment industries most respected and beloved talent buyers passed away on Sunday May 14 at Genesis Hospital in Zanesville.

George was a unique individual and in the country music community and county fair industry thousands of people considered him a friend. It would be hard to access the number of lives he touched in his 55-year career.

Toby Keith once said, "George you put a lot of meals on the tables of the boys in the band and crew and diapers on their babies over the years."

Trace Adkins stated, "George you fed my kids with all the dates you booked."

Randy Owen of Alabama said, "George was a great friend."

George attended The Ohio State University his freshman year majoring in business, while there he played trumpet with a dance band and got the idea to secure dates for other dance bands.

His sophomore year he transferred to Muskingum College where he started to book local bands on the side at fraternity parties and social clubs. George founded Variety Attractions in 1961.

Little did he know at the time that Variety Attractions would eventually become a brand that is one of the most respected, trusted, and honored companies in the entertainment world.

Booking artist like **Dolly Parton, Loretta Lynn, Tammy Wynette, George Jones, Alabama, Garth Brooks, Toby Keith, Trace Adkins** and more from the beginning of their careers and throughout them. To date Variety Attractions has booked over \$1.2 Billion in contracts since its inception and now operates in 24 states.

Not only a fan of music, but George also had a love for the circus world. The animals, the high wire performers, the daredevils, and the excitement the circuses brought to small towns. He recognized this and started booking the animal acts, the high wire acts at local and county fairs across the country.

Over the years as Variety Attractions grew, George was honored on numerous occasions from the Country Music Association naming him the SRO promoter/talent buyer of the year 4 times. He was the Academy of Country Music Awards Talent Buyer of the year 3 times as well as receiving honors from many state fair associations, including being inducted into the Ohio Fair Managers Hall of Fame. He served 3 terms as a director on the Country Music Association Board of Directors and visited the White House under President Jimmy Carter. George was one of the founding members of the International Country Music Buyers Association in Nashville, along with his colleagues Don Romeo and Hap Peebles. Today the organization is known as the International Entertainment Buyers Association and is recognized as the premier organization for talent buyers of all genres. He served on the board of directors for 30 years received the Founders Award in 2010 and inducted into their Hall of Fame in 2018.

George was a man who found his passion and lived it daily as he dedicated his entire life to the entertainment business. He had a natural sense of caring for his clients and colleagues. Those who knew him can attest to that.

Surviving is his wife Shirley (Williams) Moffett; daughter Amy (Rob) Gray; 2 granddaughters Megan (Gray) Van-Dyke; and Elaine Gray.

His legacy will live forever with the George Moffett Scholarship that is endowed at Belmont University in Nashville and awarded annually to a deserving student majoring in an accredited music business class.

All these numbers were derived from strong participation and your generosity and without any increase in fees.



This year's record event will contribute to our continuing record of keeping the OFMA's financial position strong and will keep the OFMA/GOSA PAC where we need it to be, so that we can continue to effectively advocate for our fairs and the fair industry. Your generous support has also allowed us to initiate our 100th Anniversary fund at \$6,000 and over the next two year's our activities and finances will place a major focus on our 100th 1Anniveerslry celebration at the 2025 convention.

As your financial watch dog for the past 20 years, every time I feel a need to maybe be concerned with our finances, you have never failed to amaze me with your commitment to the OFMA and our industry. THANK YOU.



News from Gallia County Fair

The Gallia County Junior Fair continues their efforts in moving the fairgrounds out of the flood plain. So far, a new horse barn was constructed by our local Thomas Do It Center and donated to the fair.

A 100' x 210' pavilion was constructed in three phases utilizing insurance money from the total loss of our commercial building in a February 2015 fire, and grants from ODA and the Southern Ohio Agr. Community Development Fund. Last fall, we moved approximately 20,000 cubic yards of dirt for future building sites.

Currently, we are installing sanitary sewer lines, storm water drainage, water lines, and roads made possible through a Appalachian Development Program Grant. Due to generous contributions from the Gallia County Commissioners and the Ohio Valley Bank, and a Capital Budget Bill Grant, we have partial funding for a 160' x 450' (approximately) livestock building. We are continuing our efforts to pursue additional funding to make this building a reality.

On the horizon is an approximately 100' x 200' year round facility which would serve as the commercial building and house the non-livestock projects during the fair, and would be rented out for functions throughout the remainder of the year.

OFMA Supports HB 135, Excused Absence for 4-H and FFA Students

Chairman Bird, Vice Chair Fowler Arthur, Ranking Member Robinson and members of the House Primary and Secondary Education Committee, thank you for the opportunity to express the Ohio Fair Managers Association's (OFMA) support of House Bill 135. The OFMA is the statewide association representing Ohio's 95, county fairs, independent fairs and the Ohio State Fair.


HB 135 would require schools to allow students to take excused absences from class for 4-H and Future Farmers of America (FFA) activities. These programs are encouraging the future generation to continue the farming and agriculture traditions of this state. It is important that these students are empowered to participate in these activities without fear of any repercussions for their traditional education and studies.

The Junior Fair activities are the premier events at our fairs for the Ohio youth to shine a spotlight on the work they did on the projects. Whether that be livestock, crafting, cooking or STEM activities, all youth participating gain important experience. They learn useful tools they can carry with them for a lifetime, for example: the importance of animal health, commitment to deadlines and completing projects, good sportsmanship, etc. We need to promote and encourage these traits in Ohioans! Not all learning happens in the classroom and students who are committing their time to participate in these projects and programs, need to feel supported by their schools as well.

This bill is particularly important because more schools are returning to class earlier in the summer. We have included the 2023 county fair schedule as an addendum to this testimony. Please note the high number of fairs that are held in August, September and even into October. These 4-H and FFA participants should never be made to feel like attending the fair to showcase their work is a sacrifice to their K-12 education. These activities should be complementary to their education and development as young citizens. We know many school districts are supportive of these students during the week of the fair, but creating a statewide standard that these absences will be excused is important.

Chairman, members of the committee, the OFMA appreciates your consideration and hope the legislation is favorably passed.








Bill Would Create Agriculture Designations

Legislation from Representatives Roy Klopfenstein and Darrell Kick is moving quickly. <u>House Bill 162</u> would create several designations that are agriculture related. They are as follows:

March 21st – Agriculture Day An end week of February – FFA Week October 12th – Farmers Day

The week ending with the second Saturday of March – 4-H Week

The OFMA was able to submit comments in support of the bill before the House Agriculture Committee on May 16, 2023. Kirk Bloir from OSU Extension presented proponent testimony. The bill has already been favorably reported by the committee and awaits a vote by the full House of Representatives.

Fraud Reporting Legislation

Senator Tim Schaffer has introduced <u>Senate Bill 91</u> regarding fraud reporting and education. This bill is supported by Auditor Faber and several local government groups, including the County Commissioners Association. The intent is to catch fraud and abuse sooner then would normally be uncovered during an entity's financial audits.

- Requires the Dept. of Administrative Services to administer training material (created by the State Auditor) about Ohio's fraud reporting system and how to report fraud, waste and abuse to each new employee or elected official upon taking office or beginning employment with a public office (fair board members are not considered elected officials);
- Requires officials and employees to confirm receipt of the material within 30 days of taking office via signature;
- Requires the training to be administered every 4 years;
- Requires all of the following to report violations of laws, misuse of resources or a cybersecurity event immediately to the AOS via the fraud reporting system:
- o Elected officials.
- o Public appointments
- o Individuals with fiduciary duty to a public office
- o Supervisors in a public office
- o Public employees responsible for processing expenses of their office
- o States individuals who recklessly fail to report fraud may be found as have committed dereliction of duty;
- o Also allows employees to file written reports of violations to their supervisors; Bans disciplinary action against individuals who report fraud;

There is an amendment scheduled for next week that would remove the cybersecurity provisions (to be included in a separate bill) and remove language making recklessly failing to report fraud a dereliction of duty.

State Budget Process On-Going

The first half of odd numbered years are dominated by debate on the state's biennial budget bill. The process starts with the Governor's proposal, which has been introduced as House Bill 33. The House passed their version of the proposal on April 26, 2023, by a vote of 77-19. The House made some significant changes to the Governor's proposal. The bill is now being considered by the Ohio Senate, who is expected to make significant additional changes. The process will culminate with a conference committee in June to craft a final bill for enactment.

Among the notable changes in the House were regarding tax policy. The House version reduces, beginning in tax year 2023, the number of income tax brackets, by consolidating the lowest bracket (2.765% for income between \$26,050 and \$46,100) with the second lowest bracket (3.226% for income between \$46,100 and \$92,150). Reduces the rate of that new lowest bracket to 2.75%. The Senate will also be looking at tax policy and could propose even great reductions.

The Ohio Fair Managers Association has been advocating for a substantial increase in the Ohio Department of Agriculture budget line Item GRF 700501 that is used to reimburse county and independent agricultural societies for their Junior Fair activities.

Rod Arter, OFMA Past President, testified before the House Finance Subcommittee on Agriculture, Development and Natural Resources on March 21, 2023, regarding this request. The House version of the budget did increase the junior fair line item to \$760,000 per year. (this represents double the investment from the as-introduced version). The House version also appropriates \$4.7 million in the second fiscal year to be used to support county and independent agricultural societies.

Roger Smith testified before the Senate Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee in favor of the House version of the bill on May 3, 2023. OFMA members are encouraged to contact their Ohio Senators requesting they support the appropriations for fairs. In addition to the traditional appropriations for the Ohio Exposition Commission, the bill includes \$95 million per fiscal year for EXPO 2050. This will be used for the renovations to the State Fairgrounds, a priority project for the Governor.

Virgil Strickler testified on behalf of the Expo Commission before the House Finance Subcommittee on Agriculture, Development and Natural Resources regarding the budget requests and plans for grounds renovations. OFMA is also supporting the appropriations for the State Fairgrounds.

4-H Legislation Has Hearings

Legislation was introduced in 2022 to require schools to provide students with excused absences for participating in 4-H activities. Representatives Thomas Hall and Rodney Creech have reintroduced the concept through House Bill 135. This version allows for excused absences for 4-H and FFA activities. The bill does not allow these excused absences to occur during scheduled state testing or during a period of time the student might otherwise be disciplined, suspended or expelled. The OFMA formally weighed in with proponent testimony for the May 23, 2023 hearing before the House Primary and Secondary Education Committee. Other proponents include, OSU Extension, the Ohio Association of Agricultural Educators, The Farm Bureau, several FFA and 40H students and GOSA. The committee seems very much in favor of the legislation.

August Election Teed Up

The Ohio legislature has approved a measure, SJR2, that would do two things: Provide for an August 8, 2023 special election.

On the August ballot would be a constitutional amendment to raise the threshold to change Ohio's constitution to 60% of the vote, from the current 50% +1.

The issue will appear on the August ballot as Issue 1. This highly publicized proposal will bring about many competing messages. Several large business groups like the Ohio Farm Bureau and the Ohio Chamber of Commerce have come out in support of the initiative. They are not supporting the effort because of social issues (like a possible reproductive rights amendment proposal) but because of efforts to put issues such as increasing the minimum wage on the ballot. Opposing the measure of union groups and reproductive freedom organization, who view Issue 1 as a way to squash their ballot initiative effort. Expect to hear a lot more about this issue over the next couple of months.

Catalytic Converter Legislation

Representatives Bob Young and Bill Roemer have introduced legislation in response to the increase in catalytic converter thefts in Ohio. The bill, <u>House Bill 110</u>, would make catalytic converters a special purchase article, requiring scrap metal dealers who purchase them comply with additional requirements

Minimum Wage Legislation and Ballot Initiative

As is the case every General Assembly, legislation has been introduced to increase Ohio's minimum wage. This year it is <u>House Bill 96</u>. HB 96 is sponsored by Representatives Dontavius Jarrells and Ismail Mohamed. Under the bill the minimum wage would increase \$1 per year until it reaches \$15 in 2028, after that the rate would increase based on inflation.

Separately, a group called Raise the Wage Ohio is pursuing a statewide ballot initiative. They recently had their language certified by the Ohio Attorney General's office and the Ohio Ballot Board. This proposal would take the minimum wage to \$15 an hour in January 2026.

Youth Employment Bill Passes Senate - Making Progress in House

Senator Tim Schaffer (R) has reintroduced <u>Senate Bill 30</u> regarding youth employment. The bill would allow those under 16 to be employed after 7pm during school year. It would state that with parent or guardian's permission, those under 16 could work until 9pm. The Ohio Senate has already favorably passed SB 30 by a vote of 25-7. The bill was then considered by the House Commerce and Labor Committee which has reported the bill. It now awaits action by the full House of Representatives.

Strickler to Retires from the Expo Commission

The Ohio Exposition Commission has announced that the 2023 State Fair will be Virgil Strickler's last one as General Manager. After nearly 30 years with the Expo Commission, Mr. Strickler is retiring. To commemorate his dedication and service to the fair, the Youth Reserve Program is being renamed in his honor. The state will under go a nationwide search for Strickler's replace. That search committee will be led by ODNR Director Mary Mertz.

OSHA's National Emphasis Program Fall Protection

On May 1, 2023, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) announced it began a National Emphasis Program (NEP) designed to prevent falls (https://www.osha.gov/news/newsreleases/national/05012023). Falls are among the most common causes of serious work-related injuries and deaths. According to OSHA and the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), since 2014 there have been a total of 12,049 fatal workplace injuries due to falls. Of those 12,049 fatalities, 5,369 were" Fatal falls to lower levels" and 6,680 were due to "Slips, trips and falls." These injuries and fatalities are preventable, so a National Emphasis Program is necessary to ensure these hazards are being addressed. In fact, year after year, both Fall Protection – General Requirements (29 CFR 1926.501) and Fall Protection – Training Requirements (29 CFR 1926.503) are among OSHA's Top 10 Violations.

This NEP will establish guidelines for OSHA compliance and safety officers to initiate inspections under the scope of the NEP whenever they observe someone working at heights. This may occur during an inspector's normal workday travel while enroute to, from or during other OSHA inspections. As with all NEP's, OSHA will have a 90-day outreach program for industry to focus on educating employers about effective ways to keep employees safe. Although this NEP is geared towards the construction industry, general industry and agriculture will be targeted as well.

Employers, according to OSHA, are required to keep a safe workplace for their employees by:

- Providing working conditions that are that are free of known hazards,
- Ensuring work areas and floors are clean and dry, as far as possible,
- 3) Selecting and providing required personal protective equipment at no cost to workers, and
- Training workers about hazards in languages they understand.

In addition, employers should follow the guidelines below to prevent falls and help minimize inspections.

- Ensure every floor hole into which a worker can accidentally walk is properly guarded. Using a railing and a
 toe board or a floor hole cover are acceptable means.
- If there are open sided platforms, floors or runways, provide a guard rail and toe-board around them.
- Regardless of height, if a worker can fall into or onto dangerous machines or equipment (such as a vat of acid or a conveyor belt) employers must provide guardrails and toe-boards to prevent workers from falling and getting injured.
- Evaluate all other jobs that require fall protection that include safety harness and line, safety nets, stair railing and handrails.

As you can see, OSHA is taking injuries and fatalities due to falls, very seriously. They will be increasing inspections and enforcement at any time they see employees working at heights. Employers can minimize the impact of these inspections and enforcement activities and protect employees by following fall protection regulations for construction, general industry, and agriculture.


