OHIO FAIR MANAGERS CONVENTION JANUARY 7-10, 2027

Planning is fully underway for the 102 Annual Conference and Tradeshow at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Columbus. Programing will be similar to the past with the Market Place Tradeshow on Friday and Saturday January 8-9 in the same locations. The Columbus Fire Marshal has approved the tradeshow layout and it is included in this newsletter.

Those of you who reserved their tradeshow spaces those will be in your registration portal file when you go into register, those of you who did not the picker will allow you to select your desired space or spaces. Our past sponsors who have first right of refusal those spaces are designated with your name on them until you opt in or out of your sponsorship agreement.

Those of you who have suites, those are locked and held by the OFMA office until 12-5-26 and then will go to the list of companies who are seeking suites. The OFMA office has made arrangements to lock the past history of sleeping rooms for the suite holders so these are available till December 5, 2026. The office will send those out after Labor Day. The Hilton has 10 varying sized suites and will be available in the Hilton booking link. The OFMA office will notify you ahead of the Hotel links going live and the Registrant Platform opening.

The OFMA MARKET PLACE TRADE SHOW provides a unique opportunity for exposure and contact with approximately 2000+ decision makers from Ohio's 95 fairs, with representatives of member Ohio's Festivals as well as over 400 concessionaires. Hospitality will be offered Friday and Saturday in 3 areas of the tradeshow around 2:30 PM. Must have a 2027 Registrant Badge to access this Hospitality

Associate Member cost is \$115 which provides 2 Convention Registrations, Tradeshow space cost are \$395-\$900. additional Convention Registrations paid prior to November 30 are \$75, after November 30 they are \$100. <https://ohiofairs.org/register/>

*Gas engine exhibits must be minimum fuel, fuel cap tapped off and the keys given to the Tradeshow chairman.

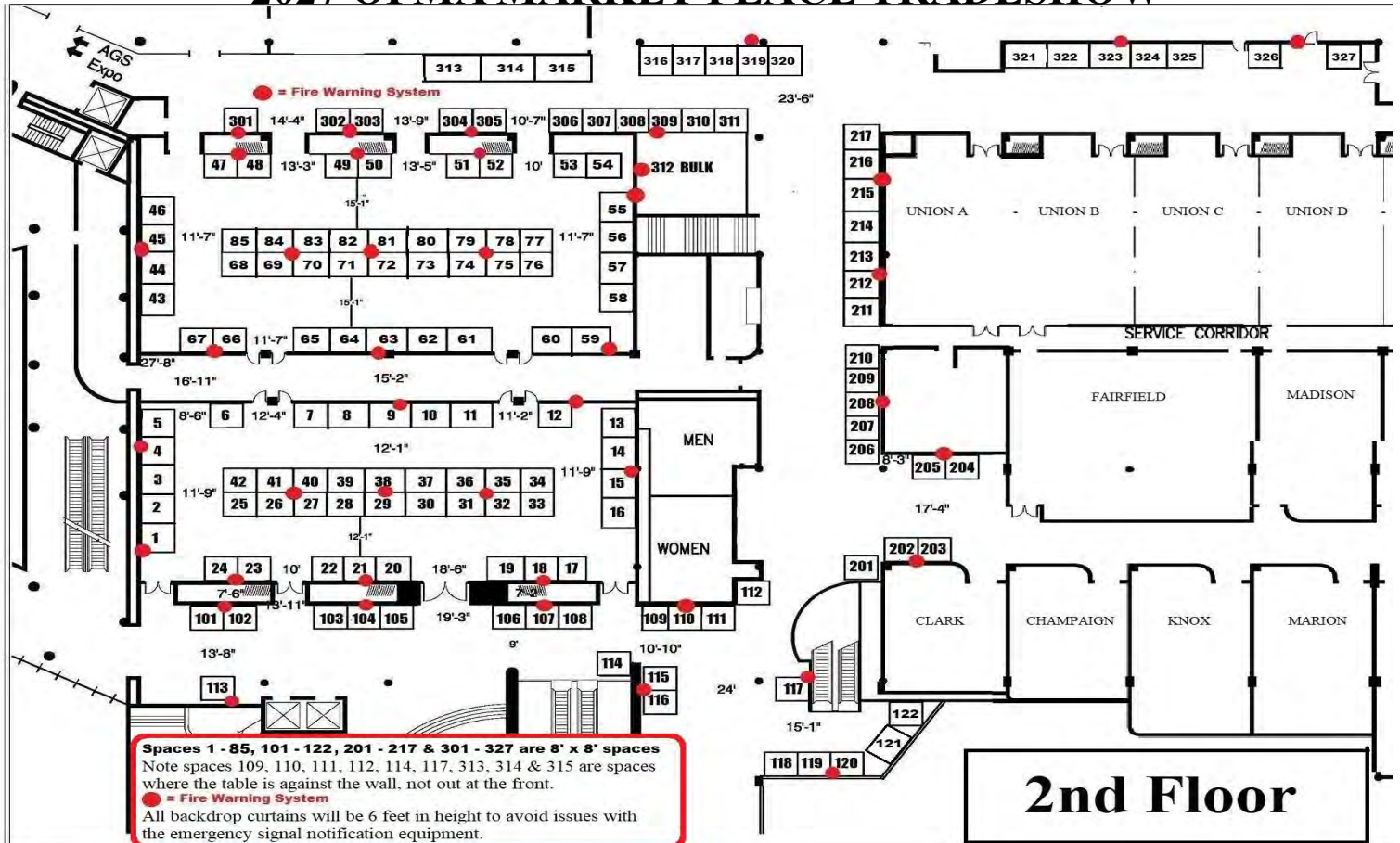

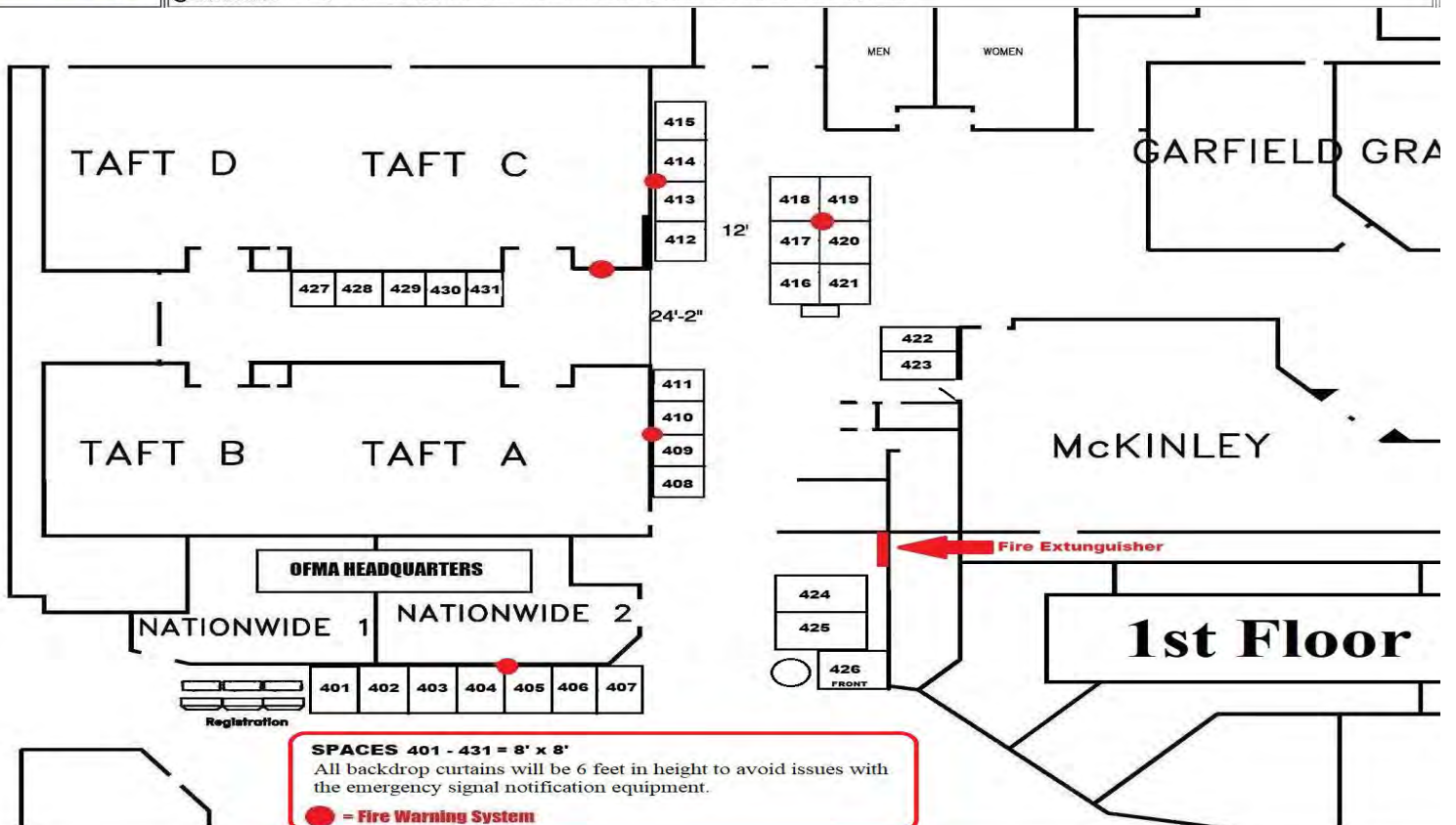

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Geater Ohio Showman Lifetime Achievement Award Jo Ellen Albanese Ohio State Fair

Few people in the fair industry can claim a lifetime of service as deep, broad, and impactful as this nominee, whose dedication spans 47 years—from concession trailers at age 11 to HR leadership for one of the nation's top ten state fairs. Her journey began at just 11 years old with Hoover Concessions. From the very beginning, she learned the business the traditional way—through long hours, overnight travel, set-ups, teardowns, and working concession trailers at fairs and events across not just Ohio, but many other states.

Remarkably, 47 years later, she still assists Hoover Concessions, demonstrating a lifelong commitment to the people and traditions of the industry. She served as an owner-operator in the concession business and continues to assist family at events and behind the scenes. She simultaneously brought her expertise to the corporate level while working with Cox Concessions, supporting operations across the industry. For more than 20 years, she has served the Ohio Expo Center & State Fair, working in the finance office, ticketing, and directly with hundreds of concessionaires, livestock exhibitors, and vendors—building relationships and supporting the smooth operation of the fair each year. She also implemented the fair's camping reservation system, modernizing operations and improving the experience for exhibitors and vendors.

Today, Jo Ellen wears many hats during the Ohio State Fair, serving as Human Resources Administrator, overseeing the hiring of more than 1,000 seasonal employees annually, managing all fair camping operations, and supporting one of the largest events in the state, consistently recognized as one of the top ten state fairs in the country. She also visits other fairs to assist with human resources matters and provide guidance on fair operations and industry-related topics. Her contributions extend beyond her daily responsibilities. She has been an active leader within the Greater Ohio Showmen's Association (GOSA), serving in every leadership role and ultimately becoming its first woman President, an achievement that reflects both her leadership and the respect she has earned throughout the industry. She also shares her expertise by presenting at OFMA conventions and serving on the IAFE Human Resources Administrators Committee, helping fairs nationwide strengthen their workforce practices. Maybe most importantly, she embodies the spirit of the fair industry itself. She will always answer a call, offer advice, and help solve a problem. Her willingness to mentor, guide, and support colleagues, exhibitors, and vendors has earned her widespread respect across the industry. From concession trailers to corporate offices to state government service, her career reflects a lifetime of dedication, leadership, and impact on fairs and the communities they serve. OHIO FAIRS HALL OF FAME AWARDS PROGRAM INFORMATION FOR DISTINGUISHED SERVICE TO THE FAIR INDUSTRY

RULES FOR OHIO FAIRS HALL OF FAME AWARD

(**NOTE Nominations must be received by the OFMA office on or before October 20th)

1. In recognition of devoted and invaluable service rendered to the Ohio fair industry, an annual Award will be presented to individuals who exemplified and distinguished themselves by their leadership under conditions wherein described.
2. The presentation of the Awards will be made at the Annual Convention on Sunday Jan. 5th at the Awards Breakfast.
3. The Awards shall consist of a plaque with an appropriate citation and the name of the recipient inscribed thereon. The recipient's name will be added to the OFMA Hall of Fame. The Awarder's fair or company will also be presented a plaque.
4. The Awards are not mandatory if there are no sufficiently qualified nominees.

ELIGIBILITY

1. The conditions of eligibility are as follows:
 - a) The nominee may be living or deceased.
 - b) The nominee shall have served as a Director, Officer, Volunteer, Friend of the Fair, Fair Manager, be an Affiliate of an OFMA member fair or be a current or past OFMA Associate Member.
 - c) Nominee shall have contributed to the growth of the fair; i.e. gate, Jr. Fair, grounds, buildings, entertainment, racing, etc.
 - d) Nominee shall have contributed to the fair industry something of value in the field of leadership and/or education.
 - e) Nominee shall have been supportive in the affairs of the OFMA.
 - f) Nominee shall have been involved in other community functions.
 - g) Nominee shall have developed and built-up his/her own fair and his/her own staff and working group.
 - h) Distinguished achievement to be considered may include significant contributions to the knowledge and advancement of the fair industry; the design or invention of material, equipment, processes, or technical services; or outstanding service to associations, companies and other organizations serving the fair industry.
 - i) An OFMA President shall not be considered for the Award until two (2) years after his/her term expires.

As we approach the 2026 Ohio County Fair racing season, the Ohio Harness Horsemen's Association is happy to report that the OHHA Board of Directors has voted to raise purses in each division as well as make up the difference in the shortfall of Fair Funds.

This year the OHHA will be adding \$1,000 to each division. When added to the distribution from the Ohio Fair Funds and the Fair Board contribution, base purses will be \$12,000 before nominations and entry fees.

The OHHA will also continue its Fair Support with \$13,000 grants for fairs racing one day and \$15,000 for fairs racing more than one day. Non-racing fairs will each receive \$2,000 grants.

The OHHA Board also voted to raise the pool for Capital Improvement Grants to \$150,000 with a match of \$20,000 to support fairs that have projects to benefit harness racing.

Your fair vets that oversee the testing of the harness horses are entitled to a \$225 stipend from the Ohio State Racing Commission for each race card. They will need to submit an invoice to the Commission. The OHHA will have a fillable PDF invoice available on our website once the fair season begins.

Harness racing will take place at 66 county and independent fairs with over 125 race cards scheduled.

Again in 2026, the OHHA will live stream every race from every fair. Last year over 1,500 races were seen on YouTube and Facebook, garnering over a million views. Please send your Queen and King to our broadcast location to talk about how great your fair is.

As part of the racing season, the OHHA will once again have our passport program. Fans can get a passport and receive a stamp when attending fairs and major racing events across Ohio. The goal of the passport is to get fans to attend county fairs.

The OHHA will also be celebrating the Semi quincentennial this year with a t-shirt giveaway at the racing fairs.

In other harness racing news from around the state, the transition of Northfield Park from MGM to Clairvest has taken place. The new owners will brand Northfield Park as Northfield Park Racino.

Editors Note: OHHA represent over 3,700 members consisting of drivers, trainers, caretakers, owners, fans and delivers 2.7 billion dollars in annual economic activity around racing, supporting agriculture, and Ohio's county fairs.



Department of Development Grant Reports Due

All fairs are required to submit a post project report to the Ohio Department of Development. These are due by June 30, 2026. Failure to submit the report will result in a recapture of the funding. Questions about the report can be directed to: CountyandIndependentFairs@development.ohio.gov. This is to report post grant review regarding the funding provided in 2024 through a \$10 million appropriation.

Excused Absences Legislation Clears House

Representatives Thomas Hall and Rodney Creech introduced [House Bill 125](#) to allow for excused absences participation in 4-H and FFA activities. The bill was expanded in the House to include “scheduled school-sponsored or workforce preparation activities approved by the district.” In addition to 4-H and FFA activities or programs, athletic tournaments, field trips, internships, and shadowing opportunities would qualify.

The bill does not allow these excused absences to occur during scheduled state testing or during a period of time the student might otherwise be disciplined, suspended or expelled. The bill also requires the 4-H or FFA educator to submit documentation to the school affirming the student’s participation. *OFMA submitted formal proponent testimony on this bill in the House. It passed unanimously on March 18th and will now be considered in the Ohio Senate.*

Amusement Ride Fee Bill Passes House

Representatives Roy Klopfenstein and Sarah Fowler Arthur have introduced [House Bill 433](#) to enact the ride fee changes that were proposed in the budget but ultimately not included. The House had retained the Governor’s proposal, but the Senate removed it. The bill will generally decrease the permit and inspection fees for inflatable rides, while increasing fees for other mechanical rides and roller coasters. This bill was first considered by the House Agriculture Committee. Supporting the bill are inflatable ride companies, while GOSA provided in person opponent testimony. OFMA submitted opponent testimony with concern increased costs to the ride company would be passed on to agricultural societies. Despite objections, the House passed the bill by a vote of 85-4 and is now being considered by the Senate.

On-Line Raffle Clarification Considered

Representatives Meredith Craig and David Thomas have introduced [House Bill 476](#) regarding on-line raffles. According to the summary the bill, among other things will: *Divides raffles into two categories: a “traditional raffle” that uses only physical tickets and an “online raffle” that uses an online raffle platform and electronic representations of tickets. On-line raffles could only be conducted by platforms approved by the Attorney General. Restricts the type of prizes and timing of drawings for online raffles. Clarifies that an entity that conducts a traditional raffle may accept electronic payments for tickets and may sell tickets over the internet or by other remote means, so long as certain requirements are met*

These changes are being made under the charitable gaming law. Sponsors and supporters indicated they didn’t know that selling tickets on-line was not authorized. Certain charities had been investigated by the Attorney General’s office and were told that current law did not authorize selling tickets or conducting raffles on-line.

This legislation was considered by the House Finance Committee which made a number of changes during their process. The bill passed the Ohio House by a vote of 85-0 and will now be considered in the Senate.

Legislative Report Continued: *Prevailing Wage Legislation*

Representative Beth Lear and Meredith Craig have introduced [House Bill 513](#) that would generally make paying prevailing wage optional for political subdivisions. It also raises the threshold for prevailing wage projects to \$5 million for new construction and \$250,000 for reconstruction. Those thresholds would be adjusted annually based on inflation.

This legislation was referred to the House Commerce and Labor Committee.

Marijuana Law Changes Go Into Effect

After much discussion and uncertainty, [Senate Bill 56](#) has gone into effect. This law makes changes to the recreational marijuana law passed by voters in 2023. The bill also addressed hemp products, generally banning their sales outside of marijuana dispensaries.

Regarding marijuana public use, SB 56 prohibits public smoking or vaping of marijuana and only allows the use on privately owned real property that is used primarily for residential purposes. Regarding hemp, the bill generally bans products in line with language enacted by the federal government in the bill to end the government shutdown. The bill as passed by the legislature did treat hemp beverages differently to allow the sale of limited hemp beverages through the end of 2026. However, the Governor exercised his line-item veto authority on that provision, so all hemp derived product sales are banned outside of dispensaries starting in March.

Youth Employment Bill Vetoed

Senator Tim Schaffer's legislation regarding youth employment, [Senate Bill 50](#), would have allowed those under 16 to be employed after 7pm during school year. It would have stated that with a parent or guardian's permission, those under 16 could work until 9pm. SB 50 passed the Ohio Senate by a vote of 24-9 and passed the Ohio House by a vote of 60-30. In addition to GOSA, proponents include the NFIB Ohio and the Ohio Restaurant and Hospitality Alliance. The bill was delivered to Governor DeWine, however he exercised his veto authority, so the law will not go into effect.

Public Comment Legislation

[House Bill 609](#) has been introduced by Representatives David Thomas and Meredith Craig. It would require all public bodies to allow public comment in their open meetings. The entities would be required to allow for public comment before taking formal action on any item. The body may provide reasonable restrictions on the length and nature of the comments. The body could also not require obtaining approval for providing comment. This bill is being considered by the House General Government Committee.

Allergen Disclosures Legislation

Legislation has been reintroduced by Representatives Munira Abdullahi and Tom Young regarding food allergen disclosures on menus. [House Bill 364](#) would require all food service operations to denote on their menu (including menu boards) the food items that contain milk, eggs, fish, crustacean shellfish, tree nuts, peanuts, wheat, or soybeans. This bill has been referred to the House Agriculture Committee and there have been 2 hearings. At the proponent hearing on November 5th, the committee accepted an amendment to require chain restaurants to also provide sodium warnings on their menus. A chain restaurant would be one with more than 20 locations. The amendment was supported by the American Heart Association. At a 3rd hearing on February 25, 2026, the Ohio Restaurant and Hospitality Association testified in opposition to the bill.

Public Expenditure Data Base

Legislation from Representatives Tom Young and Bob Peterson would require the creation of Ohio Local Government Expenditure Database. [House Bill 413](#) would require public entities to report expenditure and revenue data to the state and that information would be available to the public. This would be an expansion of the Ohio Checkbook that is used to track and report state expenditures. The following entities are required to participate: counties, cities, villages, townships, public libraries, park districts, school districts, regional water and sewer districts, and regional transit authorities. The bill was favorably reported by the House Technology and Innovation Committee. Because the bill contains an appropriation it will also need to be considered by the House Finance Committee.
